# Jack Ives Presentation on Climate Change in Iceland (by Hilde Huus)

Canadian Nordic Society members and guests were treated on March 16 to a truly engrossing lecture by member Dr. Jack Ives, on his own personal experiences and observations as a research scientist studying glaciers in Iceland. His lecture was illustrated with many stunning photos taken over the years from 1952 to quite recently.

Jack explained at the outset that he considers the human element of great importance in the study of geography. He has always paid close attention to what local Icelanders told him about the changing conditions of the glaciers and the surrounding area. As farmers, they and their ancestors lived in close communion with nature and were very conscious of changes in the local flora and fauna, and in the size and position of their local glaciers. They carefully documented many of those changes. Their accounts of historic changes in the local landscape can yield significant clues to be taken into account by scientists who are trying to piece together the natural history of the area. Jack noted that some of the local Icelanders believe they can trace their ancestry right back to the first settlers, and they may well be correct in this belief. The Icelandic sagas certainly seem to have some foundation in historical events.

Below is an example of the breathtakingly beautiful slides Jack showed us. He also showed us some illustrations of how the glaciers have changed over time. I was most impressed by one slide illustrating that although a glacier may appear to have receded by only a few meters, the actual mass of the glacier overall can have shrunk by 50% or more. This was an eye-opener for me.




A very lively question and answer session followed the lecture. It was apparent that Jack's audience was captivated by his account of his adventures as a research scientist, not just in Iceland but all over the world.

Jack Ives has published many books and articles over the years. His most recent, "Baffin Island: Field Research and High Arctic Adventure, 1961 to 1967" was published by the University of Calgary Press, which describes it as follows:

Baffin Island encompasses both field research and High Arctic adventure. The research trips to Baffin between 1961 and 1967 also served as a vital training ground in polar studies for university students; further, they represented a breakthrough in gender equality in government-sponsored science, thanks to the author's persistence in having women permitted on the teams. The book contains a special section detailing the subsequent professional achievements of the many researchers involved (in addition to the later career moves of Ives himself) and a chapter that delves deeper into the science behind their fieldwork in the North. Readers need not be versed in glaciology, however. Ives has produced a highly readable book that seamlessly combines research and adventure.

#### **More on Daniel Gibson Harris**

The list of CNS presidents in the March issue and the article on its first president, Daniel Gibson Harris, sparked quite a bit of discussion at our March luncheon. Several of our members remembered Dan Harris's habit of greeting each member with a handshake at every event. Peter McNaughton recalled that when he and his wife attended their very first CNS meeting at the "Crow's Nest", Dan Harris came over to welcome them and bought them a drink. I didn't know what the "Crow's Nest" was, until Eric Järvlepp told me that it was an attic room in the Navy Officers' Mess that was reached by a wooden staircase.

Eric provided me with his recollections of the origins of the Canadian Nordic Society. As he remembers it, Dan and his wife were originally members of the Scandinavian Club of Ottawa, founded in 1952. In 1963, a large group split off to form the Danish Club, leaving only a small group of members in the Scandinavian Club of Ottawa. "The last meeting of the Scandinavian Club felt like a funeral", he recalls. "A new club, the Canadian Nordic Society of Ottawa, was founded".

Eric also remembers attending an award ceremony for Dan Harris at the Finnish ambassador's residence. Here is his description of that rather unceremonious event:

Dan wrote a book about the history of the Finnish Navy. Finland was a part of the Swedish Empire for 600 years until 1809. Then the Russian Army defeated the Swedish-Finnish armies and Finland became a Grand Duchy of the Russian Empire until 1917. The Commander-in Chief of The Finnish Armed Forces gave a high award to Dan Harris for his book. The award was given to him at the Finnish Ambassador's residence in Ottawa. I have forgotten what event it was, but I and my wife Leena were among the guests. It could have been their Flag Day, 4th

of June, or Independence Day, 6th of December, or some other event. Dan Harris was introduced to the General who took a box from his right pocket and gave it to him. Dan opened it and thanked him, closed the box and put it into his left pocket. The ceremony was over.
